






















Focus on Faith

For many reasons, Thanksgiving is my favorite holiday. I enjoy the process of cooking a meal and preparing my home to host family and friends. I spend a lot of time looking up new recipes and gathering familiar family ones. Each of my sons has a favorite dish that he prepares, and each looks forward to making his own contribution to our feast. Thanksgiving also has special significance in our family because my grandparents got married that day and both my parents and my husband and I got engaged then. So every year we remember these precious moments in our family's history in addition to celebrating the regular holiday.

Mass, specifically Sunday Mass, is the same concept. Eucharist comes from the Greek word eucharistia, which means "thanksgiving," so truly the Mass is a special Thanksgiving meal. Just as we prepare a meal, we should also spend time preparing to celebrate Mass. For example, we are encouraged to read and think about the Sunday readings before attending Mass and ready our souls by celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

At many family meals we tell stories. Some are recent events in our lives, some are well-known stories that never get old. At Mass we hear the stories of our faith. The atmosphere of the Church can

also help us recall our history of faith. The holy water helps us remember our baptism, and our favorite songs stir our souls when we hear them. Even the language of the Mass is familiar to Catholics. One of my cousins used to travel to Europe for work and still attended Sunday Mass while overseas because the language of the Mass, even though it was in a foreign tongue, was a comforting reminder of home.

Many times I go to my parents' house on Tuesday evenings to eat dinner with them while my youngest is at gymnastics. I will probably do this on the Tuesday before Thanksgiving as well, but just because I had dinner with my parents two days before



doesn't mean I'll skip Thanksgiving dinner. Is anything really different between these two meals? I offer thanks at both for the food and for the people I'm eating with, and both meals nourish my body. In the most basic sense, these two meals are the same, but I would never skip Thanksgiving dinner because I just had dinner with the same people two days before.

The same comparison can be made between Sunday Masses and weekday Masses. At their core, these Masses are the same: Jesus is present, we receive Him in the Eucharist, and we are sent out into the world. However, Sunday Mass has a different meaning and feel to it than a weekday Mass, just as a Thanksgiving meal differs from a Tuesday evening meal. Sunday Mass calls us to the mystery of faith in a deeper way than a weekday Mass does. Although it may seem as if Sunday Mass and weekday Mass are the same thing, take a moment to recall that the Eucharist is a Thanksgiving meal and that we should never miss the opportunity to celebrate a special meal with those who are closest to us.

School Improvements

Students and faculty returned from summer break to discover that several areas of the school had been spiffed up while they were gone. Some of the most noticeable improvements were found in the cafeteria, starting with longer windows that allow more natural light to fill the room. The cafeteria walls were also refreshed with new paint, and new baseboards and ceiling tiles were added to create a warmer look and feel. A new food warmer, freezer, and dishwasher—plus a complete deep clean—were all welcome complements to the project.

















The STEM lab was also a busy area over the break. Students returned to find an enhanced space for projects, encouraging them to use their creativity and giving them a great opportunity to express their ideas. The Lego wall was a huge success, along with other STEM supplies such as Makey Makey circuits, SNAP circuits, robot building, and KNEX. The 3D printer has received lots of student attention, with 7th graders excited to start new projects and younger grades looking forward to their own opportunities. Lastly, the marble runs and donated Hot Wheels tracks have been a hit. All of these STEM-related improvements have quickly proven popular, with many students commenting about how cool the new room is.

The art room also underwent a summertime transformation. New tables and chairs were added to help with classroom flow, the interior was repainted, and the cabinets were refinished. The students have been enjoying the new seating layout, including new overhead mobiles that help them identify their tables.







Good Shepherd Preschool

At the Good Shepherd Preschool, we are committed to encouraging the spiritual, social, physical, academic, and emotional development of each child in our care through hands-on learning. Our classroom religion instruction and the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd provide the foundation for Catholic growth and spirituality through prayer, song, play, and storytelling, and our curriculum is a discovery-based learning experience that aligns with the state's early childhood learning standards. These standards cover language arts, mathematics, science, social science, and Spanish language learning. They also address physical development, including fine and gross motor skills and health. Children are given the opportunity for independent play, participation in small-group activities, and movement through learning areas. We strive to create learning experiences to nurture the unique potential of each child.

What makes our program unique? We use the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, which is an approach to the religious formation of children that is rooted in the Bible, the liturgy of the Church, and the educational principles of Maria Montessori. Children gather in an "atrium," a room prepared just for them, which contains simple yet beautiful materials for them to use.

How do these materials help the religious life of children? If an adult hears a beautiful passage from the Bible, he or she might take a Bible, find the passage, and read it slowly again and again. That same adult might then think deeply about the words and perhaps speak to God in a thankful or hopeful prayer. But a young child who has not yet learned to read needs another way. In our atrium, our youngest learners can ponder a biblical passage or a prayer from the liturgy by taking the material for that text and working with it. For example, they might place wooden figures of sheep in a sheepfold of the Good Shepherd, set sculpted apostles around a Last Supper table, or prepare a small altar with the furnishings used for the Eucharist. Older children who have learned to read often copy parables from the Bible, place written prayers from the rite of Baptism in order, or label a timeline showing the history of God's kingdom.

St. Clare Innovators Club

For the 2022–2023 school year, St. Clare School further bolstered its STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art & Math) initiatives with the addition of the extracurricular St. Clare Innovator Club (SCIC). Students of all interests and abilities from grades 5 through 8 were invited to participate. The idea proved to be popular: The 16 available slots filled quickly and overflowed to a waiting list. SCIC is led by two St. Clare parents, professional toy designer Michael Gramelspacher and hobbyist game designer Jon Harter. The Gramelspachers have sons in 8th and 5th grades, and the Harters have a son in 1st grade.















SCIC's objective is to help students learn how to devise an original concept and convert that idea into a prototyped, functional product. The group's young innovators experience the entire process of inventing—brainstorming concepts, reviewing/refining ideas, creating and testing prototypes, and pitching the final product to others. This is achieved through weekly afterschool meetings, work on the students' own time, and occasional longer workshops on early dismissal days. SCIC's efforts culminate in two target events: the St. Clare School Toy Fair and the People of Play Young Inventor Challenge.

The Toy Fair was similar in format to a science fair and gave SCIC members the opportunity to showcase their processes and exhibit their creations to the rest of the student body and school families. Students were evaluated by and received feedback from a group of local full-time toy designers and toy store owners. Although there were no rankings or prizes for participation in the Toy Fair, the judges reviewed each concept and gave written feedback to each team. Students will use this feedback to refine their projects prior to submitting them to the Young Inventor Challenge.

Ultimately, the decision to participate in the Young Inventor Challenge is up to the students and their families. Those who choose to participate can either submit their projects virtually or present them in person at the Chicago-based event held at Radio Flyer headquarters. In past years, some of the winning projects have gone on to be licensed by toy companies and eventually found their way to store shelves!

8th Honors English/Literature

After evaluating Iowa standardized testing data from 2021, it was apparent that many St. Clare students were scoring in the top 10 to 15 percent in the English Language Arts (ELA) category. Because students with these scores tend to qualify for Honors English in high school, we wanted to serve these top ELA students in a way that is unique to our school.

We have introduced an 8th grade Honors English/Literature class for students with cumulative ELA testing scores at or above 90 percent. During this ELA block, we study both English grammar and writing, as well as stories from the Literature textbook and classic novels. The academic rigor is enhanced within this course; however, the students are also given opportunities for rich discussion, writing feedback, and creative projects.

During the first quarter, Honors English/Literature students read The Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass. Currently they're diving into the gothic novel Dracula. In the third and fourth quarters, we'll be reading and discussing the themes, historical contexts, and literary elements present in The Great Gatsby, The Boy in the Striped Pajamas, and The Outsiders, in addition to provided content within the Literature textbook. Students will also have opportunities to write varied styles of essays and creative pieces.


It is my sole objective to prepare the 8th graders in this program for success in their high school English/Literature classes. If their growth over the first quarter is any indication, they should be more than ready when they graduate. I'm grateful for the opportunity to work with these fine students in the subject areas where I find so much personal joy. Thank you, St. Clare administration and families, for trusting and supporting me to develop this Honors English/Literature program, and rest assured we will continue to reevaluate the criteria and curriculum to ensure we are meeting students' needs as the year progresses.

Mrs. Ybarra and I noticed this gap in curriculum programming while working together at another school, which inspired us to earn a micro-credential in gifted education.





units, and projects that facilitate collaborative group work as well as abstract, independent, and critical thinking. By using a scoring matrix, I was able to identify 38 St. Clare students with high scores on the Iowa ELA, Iowa Math, and CogAT standardized tests. Each year, I will continue to reevaluate the data in order to identify students who meet the scoring criteria after a new round of testing. Once students are invited into the program, they'll continue to be included in future years. Additionally, because the program is designed for pure enrichment, no grades will be taken.

Within the program, students meet weekly in paired groups—3rd graders with 4th graders, 5th with 6th, and 7th with 8th. In order to serve the 1st and 2nd graders, I facilitate whole-class enrichment lessons for those homerooms twice a month. The units I facilitate are designed around themes, such as Innovators (Authors, Inventors, Mathematicians, Artists, Engineers), Belleville Gingerbread Contest, the St. Louis Symphony Picture the Music Contest, Space, Architecture, and Stories.

I feel privileged to teach at a school like St. Clare, which has integrated this unique program into the curriculum for 1st—8th grade students. As with any new initiative, as the year progresses, I will continue to reflect on the data, feedback, and logistics so that I can better serve the high-achieving students within our school community in the coming years. I hope that the Challenge Program will provide enriching and engaging opportunities for St. Clare students to dive into collaborative, out-of-the-box, and inquiry-based topics of study.


